Coralwood School's research-based educational model includes 12 inclusion classrooms in which six to seven children with special needs and ten to fourteen typically developing children are educated together. Research shows that this model results in significant gains for special education students, including higher levels of social play, more appropriate social interactions and greater gains in language, cognitive and motor development.

Additionally, Coralwood has four self-contained classrooms that serve children with more severe disabilities or who are not quite ready for a full time inclusion classroom. Children in the self-contained classes engage in multiple learning experiences with typically-developing children throughout the school day.

The classrooms at Coralwood are led by highly specialized teachers and para-professionals who teach to a broad set of students with varied needs. The teachers work closely with the following therapists: speech/language, occupational, physical, vision and recreational. Primarily, these therapists provide services to children in the classroom and include both special needs and typical children in various therapies.

WHAT IS THE CORALWOOD FOUNDATION?

Coralwood Foundation, Inc. was incorporated in May 2005 to create a permanent endowment fund, the income of which is used to promote excellence in early childhood inclusion education at Coralwood School, and to provide a vehicle for long-term financial and volunteer support for Coralwood. The Foundation funds the educational innovations of teachers and other professionals at Coralwood, as well as a Director of Development who writes grants and raises funds for specific educational initiatives.

Currently, the efforts of the Foundation's Board of Directors are focused on the following initiatives:

- Providing learning opportunities, grants for classroom initiatives and professional development for our school staff;
- Supporting the financial goals of the Foundation through fundraisers such as our Annual Auction and grant writing activities;
- Working with the DeKalb County School System (DCSS) and the Board of Education to fund the Master Plan for Coralwood's campus in order to provide enhanced educational opportunities for our children;
- Implementing a marketing and communications plan that will leverage Coralwood School's position as the premier inclusion school in Georgia to advance support of the school and of inclusion education practices;
- Maintaining an online presence via our website to serve as a central location for comprehensive information about Coralwood, the Foundation, the PTA, related events, and parent resources;
- Actively engaging Coralwood alumni, parents and friends in the continued work of the Foundation through community involvement and outreach as part of the "Coralwood Circle of Friends" group.

The Foundation views these projects as fundamental elements to improve the education of our children now and in the future.

10 YEARS & ONWARD!

The Coralwood Foundation is 10 years old this school year. And while we look toward the next 10 years of helping children in their most impactful learning years, we also want to celebrate this important milestone.

The Coralwood Foundation began with the first Coralwood Challenge. At the time, the school was being housed in trailers on the back parking lot during a renovation. Many things were in sad shape. One parent, who asked to stay anonymous, offered to donate \$2,000 to the school if the other parents would match the gift. The Coralwood community was challenged and gave in record numbers, exceeding the original goal by \$7000. The Foundation rose out of that effort as the brain child of four parents – Janet Haury, Alex Walters, Joanie Gross and the original anonymous parent.

This group had a vision for Coralwood as a school of excellence. And the parents have responded over the years with the generosity of their time, talents and money. They have funded professional learning for teachers, workshops, classroom smart boards, playground equipment and teacher bonuses. As a result, the Coralwood Foundation has served as an example for numerous other schools who now have their own foundations. Their passion and commitment has not only improved the situation for the students at Coralwood but other schools as well. And the parents and staff currently at Coralwood continue that good work. I'm so pleased to have been a part of this effort and to see it continue to thrive 10 years later.

MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Coralwood Homecoming Event The Coralwood Foundation would like to thank all who attended and who helped make the 3rd Annual Homecoming Event on Friday, September 5th, a huge success. It was a terrific afternoon filled with music from Little Beat Music, aka DJ Willy Wow, pizza, lemonade, and Bruster's ice cream. It was great to see old friends back at the school and to meet those who are new to our community!
- Excellence in Teaching Award Gretchen Studdard received this year's Excellence in Teaching award. This Coralwood Foundation award recognizes teachers and paraprofessionals who do an outstanding job in instruction, professional learning, communication, supporting the school and leadership.
- **Coralwood Challenge** The Coralwood Foundation's annual fundraising campaign to support the school, its staff and the goals of inclusion education aimed high this year. By setting a goal of \$60,000, the campaign made possible this year's incentive initiative for maintaining our pre-K educators. The end result was more than \$55,000, close enough to make it happen!
- **Coralwood Foundation's 13th Annual Auction,** hosted by the Coralwood Foundation, netted (after expenses) more than \$41,000 this year, exceeding the planned goal of \$40,000, including more than \$6000 for this year's Fund-A-Project: Adaptive tricycles and a much-needed storage shed.
- Summer STEM Camp and A Little Bit of STEM, TOO! Two 2-week day camps fostering scientific inquiry in 78 of Coralwood's students from preschool through rising first graders.
- Inaugurated in 2008, Higher Opportunities for Teachers (HOT) is a Foundation committee funding academic and enrichment opportunities for teachers and staff that would otherwise not be supported in the school or PTA budgets. This year, 13 Coralwood staff members, including the principal, participated in a 30-hour Orton-Gillingham training. In addition, the HOT Committee enabled two teachers to attend workshops, including the annual conference of the National Arts Education Association (NAEA) and the National Conference on Science Education. The HOT committee also sent two Coralwood teachers to Lindamood Bell training.
- Saturday Parent Academy (SPA) This year's parents' educational event was open to parents of both Coralwood and non-Coralwood students and included multiple learning sessions with early education professionals. The session tracks were created so both parents could attend alternate sessions and learn more. More than 30 pre-registered and more signed up at the door.

CORALWOOD FOUNDATION ANNUAL AUCTION

Coralwood's 13th annual auction, hosted by the Coralwood Foundation, was held on Friday, February 27th at the Historic Decatur Courthouse. Last year's successful theme, "An Evening of the Arts", was a happy repeat and spotlighted the children's classroom artwork which was a big hit.

As in years past, more than 200 people, including parents, teachers, friends and community supporters, came to the new location and enjoyed restaurant tastings provided by local chefs. The addition of a step-and-repeat backdrop for the entrance added a note of fun and celebration. The year-long planning efforts of Coralwood Foundation members Jill Roark, Lane Taylor and Meg Sheid netted (after expenses) more than \$41,000, exceeding the planned goal of \$40,000. That total includes more than \$6000 for this year's Fund-A-Project: new adaptive tricycles for the playground and a much-needed storage shed for the school.



CORALWOOD CHALLENGE

The Coralwood Foundation's annual fundraising effort raised over \$55,000 in 2014, exceeding the goal by 10%. This renewal of financial support occurs each year through business, corporate and many, many individual contributions. Where does that money go?

In addition to funding the Director of Development and to further our endowment, monies raised in the 2014-2015 school year were applied to fund stipends for the teachers. Our dedicated educators have been there for Coralwood's children even while carrying the burden of severe budget cuts in their salaries. The time had come to show them how important they are to us.

In the first several years, much of it went to funding the endowment. From a novice to an experienced teacher. I cannot imagine where I would be professionally without Coralwood School, and specifically the Coralwood Foundation.

I first worked at Coralwood as a student teacher in 2005 while working on my master's degree in Early Childhood Special Education at Georgia State University. Mary Kaye Moore, a master teacher in every sense of the word, took me under her wing. She showed me how to run a classroom with structure, routine, hands-on lessons, and above all, with patience and love. A general education teacher by training, Ms. Moore explained to me that all classrooms are really inclusion classrooms. Only at Coralwood, there is the staff support and specialists who can better meet the needs of all students. When I finished my master's degree, I was offered a full time teaching job at Coralwood as a kindergarten special education teacher.

During my years at Coralwood, I grew from a novice to an experienced teacher. I greatly benefited from working closely with occupational therapists, physical therapists, orientation and mobility specialists, an expert speech-language pathologist, and a highly trained staff unparalleled in the field of early childhood education. Our principal, Rebecca Blanton, encouraged me to write several small grants, some through the Coralwood Foundation, to encourage my creativity as a teacher. All three of my grants were funded.

But my true passion became literacy. Thanks to the Coralwood Foundation, I attended state literacy conferences, received Orton-Gillingham training, and pursued AOGPE's 100-hour Associate Level practicum (courses I now teach). I received funding through the Foundation's Higher Opportunities for Teachers (HOT) committee.

I currently work as a professional learning instructor in Vermont. I teach a year-long graduate course on Orton-Gillingham, along with other literacy workshops, and supervise teachers across New England toward Orton-Gillingham certification. I speak at national conferences and webinars, and serve as the secretary of Vermont's Division of Early Childhood Education.

Although I am currently out of the classroom, I spend most of my time in K-2 classrooms, mentoring teachers as they work with their young struggling readers. I speak about my years at Coralwood, sharing strategies to help other educators better meet all learners. And Ms. Moore was right: Regardless of the classroom I walk into, they are all inclusion classrooms.

I owe so much of my professional growth to my Coralwood students and their families. They are the ones who make Coralwood and the Coralwood Foundation feel like a community. I am still in touch with many of them; many who feel more like family than former students.

My years at Coralwood molded me, and I am forever indebted.

Inclusive practices are an integral characteristic of schools that achieve strong measures of academic success. Why? Because:

- Students are educated whenever appropriate in general education classrooms with teachers skilled in the content taught.
- Opportunities to progress in the general education curriculum are greatly facilitated through inclusive practices.
- High expectations for all students are the norm.
- Instruction is differentiated to engage students on the basis of the skill sets, interests, and learning styles.
- Collaboration between general and special education staff results in flexible grouping that includes varied small group instruction, large group, and paired instruction.
- Students are actively engaged in instruction and in their own learning.
- Instructional accommodations and "scaffolding" are used to increase access to learning and academic success.
- Individual education plans identify specific accommodations, modifications and goals for each student.
- Strong parent-school partnerships are the norm.
- Ongoing training and staff development is encouraged and supported.

Ten Years Ago. When my daughter started in the three-year old program at Coralwood in 2003, the school was short on funding, volunteers and optimism.

- The principal received only \$4000 annually to meet ALL financial needs of the school beyond building costs and salaries.
- The building had broken light fixtures, peeling paint and a dingy, uninviting cafeteria.
- Classrooms were cramped, shabby and poorly equipped.
- Teachers paid for most of their classroom needs out of their own pockets. They did not receive funding for professional development or continuing education.
- The school stage was divided into cubicles as office space for staff.
- The playground was a mud hole with tree stumps, a rusty wheelchair swing and non-handicap accessible playground equipment.
- The front was a gravel parking lot (really non-handicap accessible) with no landscaping or signage.

Other parents and I were heartsick. Was this the best educational experience we could offer our special needs children?

In the 10 years since its formation in 2005, the Foundation has done much to improve the situation for Coralwood and its students. Its formation also helped build a committed and dedicated community of parents, staff and well-wishers. In these ten short years, the Foundation has...

- Fully funded the endowment through the annual Challenge campaign.
- Funds annually the salary of a Director of Development who helps determines teachers needs, writes grants to receive funding, helps carry out the funded programs and serves as the Foundation's daily presence at the school.
- Purchased some of the first Promethean interactive boards and educational iPads in DeKalb County which are now in every classroom and the media center.
- Created a nature trail and educational tree house for the students.
- Funded educational opportunities for students and staff.
- Coordinated thousands of service hours by our directors, staff, parents and volunteers.

I can't wait to see what the Foundation will accomplish in the next 10 years.
